M.G.L. c. 138, § 34

It is illegal to furnish alcohol for a person under 21 years of age

The Social Host Law is broad:

- “Furnish” can mean supply, give, provide or allow alcohol use on your premises
- You can be charged even if you are not home or did not give the alcohol to the minor
- A minor can be charged with furnishing alcohol to another minor

Criminal Penalties:

- Up to \$2,000 in fines
- Up to 1 year in jail

BE THE PARENT

- Talk to your teen about the dangers of alcohol.
- Do not let your child drink alcohol if he or she is underage.
- Do not allow your child's friends to drink alcohol or bring alcohol to your house.
- Be engaged and involved when teens are at your home.
- If you are asleep or not home while minors are drinking alcohol in your home, you can still be found criminally and civilly liable.
- Monitor your own alcohol use.
- Consider keeping alcohol in a locked cabinet.

Consequences of Underage Drinking

- Can lead to alcohol poisoning
- Increased risk for sexual assault
- Penalties for violating school and the MA Interscholastic Athletic Association's substance use policies

Drunk Driving Can Lead to

- Death and/or serious injury to yourself and others as well as criminal charges
- Long-term loss of driver's license
- Fines of up to \$5,000 and/or imprisonment for 2^{1/2} to 5 years
